# Worksheet for the Present Perfect Continuous

#### Part 3 - Instructions:

Choose the correct verb for each sentence, either the present perfect or the present perfect continuous. Write it into the blank.

- 1. Simona \_\_\_\_\_ dogs. has always loved / has always been loving
- 2. My teammates \_\_\_\_\_\_ for 15 minutes already. have practiced / have been practicing
- 3. I \_\_\_\_\_ chemistry or physics. have never understood / have never been understanding
- 4. Your clothes are dirty! What \_\_\_\_\_? have you done / have you been doing?
- 5. There you are! I \_\_\_\_\_\_ for you everywhere. have looked / have been looking

## Answers:

## Part 1

- 1. Shailee <u>has</u> <u>been</u> <u>working</u> as a web designer since she graduated from college. (work)
- 2. The customers <u>have</u> <u>been</u> <u>standing</u> in line at the ticket counter for two hours. (stand)
- 3. I <u>have</u> <u>been</u> <u>living</u> in Canada for 2 years. (live)
- 4. Martha <u>has</u> <u>been</u> <u>married</u> to Charles since she was 25. (marry)
- 5. What a long trip! We <u>have been</u> <u>driving</u> for 5 hours already. (drive)

## Part 2

- 1. How long has Shailee been working as a web designer?
- 2. How long have the customers been standing in line at the ticket counter?
- 3. How long have you been living in Canada?
- 4. How long has Martha been married to Charles?
- 5. How long have we been driving? or How long have we been driving already?

## Part 3:

- Simona <u>has always loved</u> dogs. ("Love" is a verb that doesn't work well in the present perfect continuous.)
- 2. My teammates <u>have been practicing</u> for 15 minutes already. (By using the adverb "already," you are saying that the action continues into the present. However, present perfect is also possible here.)
- 3. I <u>have never understood</u> chemistry or physics. ("Understand" is a verb that doesn't work well in the present perfect continuous.)

- 4. Your clothes are dirty! What <u>have you been doing</u>?
  ("Have you been doing" implies that the action took place over a period of time, long enough to get the clothes dirty. The clothes are still dirty in the present.
  "Have you done" implies one event that happened at one specific time in the past.)
- 5. There you are! I <u>have been looking</u> for you everywhere. ("Have been looking" implies that the seeker was looking right up until the present moment when the other person is found. "Have looked" in the present perfect is also possible, but "have been looking" is better.)
