
Worksheet for "Look" and "See"

The word "look" will usually be followed by a word like "at" or "for." This answers the question "where" you fix your eyes. Examples are "<u>look at</u> the clock," and "<u>look for</u> my keys."

The word "see" will usually be followed by a noun. This is the thing you fix your eyes on. Examples are "see <u>the table</u>," and "I see <u>you</u>."
